

North Bay and District Labour Council

The NBDLC is coming back to shape after the summer. Projects and actions typically take a break, but now that the summer is over, active members of labour council have initiated a few projects. People can expect labour council to host and promote key events like Labour Day, Activism Awards, National Day of Morning, and a few others. But the new September 30 federal holiday, Canada's first official National Day for Truth and Reconciliation, has presented NBDLC with an opportunity to call on all levels of government to act upon the 94 actionable recommendations by the TRC. To this end, the NBDLC will host a demonstration at newly elected MP Anthony Rota's North Bay constituency office at 4PM on September 30. National Day of Truth and Reconciliation, to tell MP Rota that the Federal Liberal government must recommit to reconciliation and make it a priority as they plan their new mandate.
